OVERVIEW -

The 2024 Mayors Summit Against Antisemitism – hosted by the City of Beverly Hills, California, and chaired by its Mayor, Lester Friedman, in partnership with the Combat Antisemitism Movement (CAM) – is bringing together municipal leaders from over 200 cities throughout North America and Canada in a shared mission to eradicate hate. The Summit will be more than just a meeting – it will be a pivotal step forward in our mission to combat antisemitism and protect our communities.

With the unprecedented rise in anti-Jewish discrimination plaguing our communities, mayors and other local decision-makers are uniquely positioned to counter this growing threat where it is most viscerally experienced, on the streets of their communities.

Under the theme *"Directing Change from City Hall,"* the goal of the 2024 Mayors Summit Against Antisemitism is to provide mayors with a comprehensive understanding of the current state of antisemitism and to supply them with actionable items they can implement in their own communities. The Summit will focus specifically on empowering municipal leaders to work effectively with law enforcement, adopt strong ordinances, consider campus and protest issues, and foster community unity.
